In 1927 he had photographed the plant extensively, and he would go on to examine it in works in a number of mediums.

Between 1930 and 1936, Sheeler would use these monochrome photographs to create a series of oil paintings—American Landscape, Classic Landscape, River Rouge Plant and City Interior . All these paintings used subdued colours and Sheeler had to rely on his memory to supplement the monochrome photographs on which they were based [3].
