Home Health Agencies | CMS

The home health agency caring for you is approved by Medicare (Medicare certified). You must be homebound, and a doctor must certify that you're homebound. You're not eligible for the home health benefit if you need more than part-time or "intermittent" skilled nursing care.

The term CAHPS refers to a comprehensive and evolving family of surveys that ask consumers and patients to evaluate the interpersonal aspects of health care. CMS and AHRQ have developed a Home Health CAHPS tool for surveying home health patients. Results of these surveys will be publicly reported on Home Health Compare in late 2010 or early 2011.

Qualifying Criteria for Home Health Services. Home health agencies (HHAs) have numerous regulations to abide by when providing care under the Medicare home health benefit. Knowing the regulations for qualifying criteria for home health is important to avoid survey deficiencies and medical review denials. These regulations are found in the Medicare Benefit Policy Manual (CMS Pub. 100-02), Ch. 7.

Qualifying Criteria for Home Health Services

Physician Orders, Plan of Care and Certification. All services provided under the Medicare home health benefit must be ordered by a physician. Three basic requirements for ordering services are: The ordering National Provider Identifier (NPI) must be for an individual physician (not an organizational NPI); and.

Medicare provides healthcare for almost all people age 65 or over, and some people with long-term disabilities. Coverage includes home health visits, if specific qualifying criteria are met. I.
